# **SUMMERS RESIGNS**

Derek C. Bok has been named the interim president of Harvard effective July 1. Lawrence H. Summers will resign at the end of the academic year. Corporation fellows have pledged to promptly begin a search for a new long-term

THE CRIMSON, May 29, 1990: Bok's first tenure was marked by the creation of the Kennedy School of Government, the formation of the Core curriculum, and the restoration of stability after the tumultuous tenure of Nathaniel Pusey '28.

"It's good to be home. I accept," Summers said when he was named Harvard's 27th president in 2001. Five years later, his homecoming had turned sour.
